Youth Success Story

June 2023

The Applicant came to the American Job Center in seeking assistance for training in the medical field. She spoke with the youth staff about attending Sowela for the Certified Clinical Medical Assistant program, which has been her interest since she was young. Participant was 17-year-old and an out of school youth as she had graduated high school a year early because she had enough credits to graduate. Participant was eligible for the WIOA youth program as she was on public assistance and being basic skills deficient in Math. She started the CCMA program at Sowela on 10/17/2022 with a projected end date of February 17, 2023. During her time enrolled in the WIOA youth program, she attended class on time, every day with few absences. The CCMA instructor sent over participant's progress report and reported that the participant is a very good student, works hard in her schoolwork and on tests, and is working with her peers during her time in the CCMA program in the period of 10/17/2022-01/13/2023. The participant graduated from the CCMA program on February 17, 2023, by earning a certificate of completion from Sowela. She also earned a Phlebotomy Certification. The participant gained employment at Imperial Health as a CMA working full-time making \$14.00 an hour. She was grateful that the WIOA youth program was able to help with her training, so that she can get started in her career as a CMA. Her future plans include furthering her education in the medical field.
