If you're interested in a job, you need to show the company just how eager you are about working there. While enthusiasm is important, when does it cross the line into aggressiveness? How many times can you follow up after an interview or apply for jobs within a company before you turn the employer off?

"Job applicants need to remember that HR departments and recruiters have a clear picture in mind of what types of candidates they are looking to hire, and if you are one of them, they will contact you and do so enthusiastically". "If you are not getting a good response, or any response at all, take it as a sigh that for whatever reason, they do not see you as a good fit for the corporate culture of their company. The more aggressive you are...the higher the risk you run of just being put in the annoying category..."

FOLLOWING UP AFTER SUB-MITTING YOUR RESUME

The time after you submit your appli-

cation materials can be the most confusing. You may not know whom to follow up with or if your resume has even been seen by anyone. The trick is to pace out your follow-ups by applying the "Rule of Threes," according to certified career coach and corporate trainer Kathleen Brady.

After you submit your resume, it is appropriate to follow up with an email or phone call approximately seven to 10 days and follow up again. If you emailed last time, use the phone this time. If this attempt still gets no response, try once more. If an employer does not respond after three attempts, they are likely not interested.

FOLLOWING UP AFTER AN INTERVIEW

"After you've interviewed at a company, you want to continue to reinforce your interest in the position without going overboard. If possible, use the interview as an opportunity to get an idea of the expected timeframe the employer has for filling the position," says Mary Massed, division president of recruiting services at insperity. After sending the initial thank-you note, do not follow up again unless requested by the employer or a significant amount of time has passed and it is close to the projected deadline.

GENERAL FOLLOW-UP ETI-QUETTE

It is also critical to be professional in your follow-up conversations and emails. Always maintain a friendly, professional demeanor without being overly casual or getting too personal. If sending written communication, avoid overusing exclamation marks or emotions. Thank them and the company and tell them you are excited about the opportunity and look forward to hearing from them in the future.

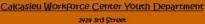
